Richard Feynman

This month's speaker at the regular meeting of the Humanist Association will be our President, Rev. Douglas Peary, presenting the latest of his very popular "Humanist Heroes" series of talks.

Perhaps best remembered for his demonstration of o-ring failure during the Challenger inquiry, Feynman is now considered one of the most lucid scientific educators of the twentieth century. His books, and videotapes of his lectures, are a common feature of popular scientific magazines.

Doug's talk will take us beyond the bare essentials of Feynman's life, and give us some of the flavor of the man's philosophy.

Humanist Conversations

The next Humanist Conversation will be on Friday, June 30, at 7:30 p.m. We will meet, as usual, at the Unitarian Society, 700 Hartford Turnpike, Hamden. Such a good time was had at the May meeting when we ordered out for Chinese we will order from Blessings II again.

Manny Ratafia recommended Isaac Asimov's nonfiction writings as a topic, along with a video of one of his speeches.

Although there isn't any "required" reading for this discussion, Manny has suggested a few (short) chapters from Asimov's delightful autobiography, his second, "I, Asimov" (New York: Doubleday, 1994, ISBN 0-385-041701-2; likely available at most public libraries).

This autobiography was written at the urging of his second wife, Janet. She suggested he start from the beginning, not giving "unending details," but the "general sweeps" and his reaction to it. Asimov was reluctant, believing that he was no deep philosopher and that no one would want to read the thoughts of an old, dying man. But after writing only a few pages, he realized that he did indeed want to write the book, since, after all, his favorite topic about which to write was himself.

The chapters in the book are from two to six pages in length and cover various topics along with personal details. Those topics that could supply material for our discussion are (with pages cited from the 1994 edition):

Chapter 5: Religion, p. 11-14

Chapter 6: My name, p. 15-18

Chapter 7: Anti-Semitism, p. 19-23

Chapter 105: The bible, p. 322-324

Chapter 107: Death, p. 325-331

Chapter 106: Life after death, p. 331-334

Chapter 151: Humanists, p. 498-500

I recommend reading even more of the book than these few chapters. Asimov's ironic and sometimes self-deprecating humor is engaging and, as he might have put it, charming.
