

Lost: One Continent; Reward: A Scientific Appraisal of the Myth of Atlantis

The story of Atlantis has intrigued people for more than two millennia: A great and powerful nation, rooted in the deepest strata of human antiquity, whose dominance over the ancient world ended virtually overnight, the result of an unimaginable cataclysm.

But what was Atlantis? Was it a real place, a dominant force on the world stage from a time only dimly remembered when its story was first committed to paper more than 2300 years ago? Was it the source of all subsequent civilizations, an inexplicably precocious society whose power was based on the control of paranormal forces? Or was Atlantis merely a plot device in a ripping good tale told by one of the ancient world's greatest minds?

History and archaeology

provide the answers to these questions in a lecture to be given by Ken Feder, professor of anthropology at Central Connecticut State University and the author of *Frauds*, *Myths*, and *Mysteries: Science and Pseudoscience in Archaeology*.
