An Art Historian in Indochina

Join us at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, September 17 at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden for an awesome tour of Indochina.

In January of 2006, Dolores (Dody) Gall traveled to Cambodia and Thailand and saw the amazing ruins of Angkor in Cambodia, a holy city built by the Khmer kingdoms from 800-1200 A.D. The temple ruins cover over 16 miles and were destroyed by invaders in 1430. She stayed in the city of Siem Riep and visited the Killing Fields Memorial dedicated to victims of the Pol Pot genocide. She then flew to Bangkok, Thailand (ancient kingdom of Siam), a multi-racial city of Buddhist, Hindu, Chinese temples and the Royal Palace. At Kanchanaburi in the north, she walked Hell Fire Pass and the bridge on the River Kwai and visited the War Museum documenting the Allied POWs who died there in World War II. Farther north is the "Golden Triangle" by Chiang Rai, once the center for opium smuggling but now a tourist destination. A side trip to Myanmar (formerly Burma), and then a forest trek on elephant near Chiang Mai, the nation's premier crafts center.

Book Description:

In her lively refutation of modern claims about America's religious origins, Brooke Allen looks back at the late eighteenth century and shows decisively that the United States was founded not on Christian principles at all but on Enlightenment ideas. Moral Minority presents a powerful case that the unique legal framework the Founding Fathers created was designed according to the humanist ideals of Enlightenment thinkers: God entered the picture only as a very minor player, and Jesus Christ was conspicuous by his absence. The guiding spirit of the Declaration of Independence and the U.S. Constitution, Ms. Allen explains, was not Jesus Christ but John Locke. In direct and accessible prose, she provides fascinating chapters on the religious lives of the six men she considers the key Founding Fathers: Franklin, Washington, John Adams, Jefferson, Madison, and Hamilton.
