

# Remembering Rabbi Sherwin Wine (1928-2007)

Join us at 7:30 p.m. on Monday, October 15 at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden for a tribute to a remarkable man.

Our program for October will be dedicated to a celebration of the life and accomplishments of Rabbi Sherwin Wine, who was a featured speaker co-sponsored by UUs for Jewish Awareness and the HUUmanists at the recent UUA General Assembly, where his topic was "A Jewish Perspective on the Future of Humanism." Tragically, less than a month later he was fatally injured in a taxicab accident in Morocco while on vacation. We will honor this great leader.

Sherwin Wine recognized that most people adopt their religious views early in life, and continue to adhere to them as adults largely out of respect for their parents, and other elders and their cultural traditions. Having grown up in a Conservative family, he then studied to become a Reform rabbi, but eventually became uncomfortable with the supernatural elements. In 1965, he was quoted in Time magazine as saying "I find no adequate reason to accept the existence of a supreme person.'

Nevertheless he continued to believe strongly in the importance of perpetuating what he saw as the best elements of the Jewish cultural traditions. From his congregation in a Detroit suburb he gathered around him a loyal nucleus of eight families of

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like-minded Jews to establish the humanistic Birmingham Temple. A few years later (1969) he founded the Society for Humanistic Judaism, based on preserving Judaism's highest ethical traditions and reverence for the value of each person, which today has some 10,000 members in 30 congregations.

In the 1980s he worked to advance cooperation among various humanist organizations, helping to found the North American Committee for Humanism. Recently Harvard University selected as its second Humanist chaplain Rabbi Greg Epstein, a young man trained in Humanistic Judaism. In this and many other ways, Rabbi Sherwin Wine has truly left an indelible mark upon American Humanism.

neural systems." The thesis of this book is that religion can be naturalized. "Naturalism is a variant of metaphysical monism [which declares] that all meaningful distinctions pertain to observed or reasoned facts within a self-contained and continuous order of being. For the naturalist, the order of being is the order of nature..." "To naturalize religion is to provide explanations for religious phenomena that are consilient [E. O. Wilson] with our scientific explanations for other natural facts." So this writer is going to tell us what aspects of our human nature respond to religion or philosophy or other considerations we have about our experience of life.

We often talk about religion as though it is equivalent to the dogmas of religious organizations. Here is a study of the functions of religious ideas and practice from the perspective of utility to survival. Rue's terms for human achievements essential to survival are "personal wholeness and social coherence."
