## 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

Join us Monday, April 20, at 7:30 p.m. at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden when we'll celebrate the 20th anniversary of the founding of the Humanist Association of Connecticut with a potluck, cake and reprise!

In the spring of 1989 the Humanists Association of Central Connecticut held its organizational meeting at USNH in what is now the Social Hall. Our speaker was Fred Edwords, then executive director of the American Humanist Association. We are thrilled that Fred will return for our 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary!

Starting as a local chapter leader in 1977, Fred went on to be executive director at the AHA for fifteen years, and editor of the Humanist for twelve. Most recently he served as director of communications for the AHA and he has just become the leader of a new organization, the United Coalition of Reason, with the purpose of developing coalitions of local humanist, freethought, atheist, Humanistic Jewish, and Ethical Culture organizations all over the country.

Fred's talk will be "Making Humanism Relevant." He says about this topic, "Humanists have gotten good at critiquing traditional religion. But we didn't become humanists merely to make such debunking our focus. Humanism offers a larger view that takes us in positive new directions. And many of those directions include vigorous activism toward social change. There is a long history of humanist and freethought social action to inspire us. Putting our values to work is a central part of our tradition. Sometimes we've had to do this by going against the grain of popular religion; at other times we've been able to leverage our influence through common cause with religious allies."
