

A Non-theistic "Modern Synthesis" of Humanism and Naturalism

We are pleased to welcome Dr. John Hooper, current president of the Association of Unitarian Universalist Humanists (HUUmanists), to tell us about a non-theistic "modern synthesis" of Humanism and Naturalism on Monday, November 21 at 7:30 p.m. at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden.

About his talk, John tells us: "Naturalists have taken a leadership role in celebrating the awesome epic of biological evolution. Humanists have celebrated the shared human experience of being alive and the inherent worth and dignity of all living human beings. Defending human freedom and drawing on the revelations of science (without resorting to supernatural hypotheses), both humanists and naturalists seek to continuously improve our objective understanding of the universe and our place in it. Exciting new multidisciplinary scientific studies are leading to new revelations about the nature of human experience itself. This nascent 'naturalizing of experience' provides a unique opportunity for celebrating a 'modern synthesis' of humanism and naturalism that requires absolutely no supernatural considerations."

John Hooper is a retired scientist and research & development executive (Ph.D., 1969, in chemistry from Carnegie Mellon University). Dr. Hooper subsequently earned a Master of Arts in Liberal Arts from Clark University in 2001. Since his retirement in 2003, he has pursued interests in science and religion, naturalism, humanism, and
