Please join us on Monday, July 17 at USNH, 700 Hartford Turnpike, Hamden, when John Pawelek will be our featured speaker with an updated version of his talk on evolution, All Life Springs from a Single Cell.

A prominent USNH member and a long-time cancer investigator at the Yale School of Medicine, John has fascinated us in the past with presentations on his work focusing on the skin cancer melanoma.

John Pawelek, Ph.D., is a member of the research faculty in the Department of Dermatology and the Yale Cancer Center, Yale School of Medicine. His research interests focus on cancer cell fusion with migratory white blood cells as a mechanism of metastasis. He has authored nearly 200 peer-reviewed papers in the areas of skin pigmentation and melanoma and is past president of the Pan American Society for Pigment Cell Research. He has won several awards for this work, including the IFPCS inaugural award of the Henry Stanley Raper Medal, and the Japanese Society for Pigment Cell Research award of the Takeuchi Medal. Book Discussion: "Riders of the Purple Sage"

Please join us at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday, July 15, at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden when we will discuss our book for July: *Riders* of the Purple Sage, a classic western by Zane Grey. Numerous copies are available in public libraries, and it is even available free online at Project Gutenberg, since it's out of copyright.

From *Goodreads*: Told by a master storyteller who, according to critic Russell Nye, "combined adventure, action, violence, crisis, conflict, sentimentalism, and sex in an extremely shrewd mixture," *Riders of the Purple Sage* is a classic of the Western genre. It is the story of Lassiter, a gunslinging avenger in black, who shows up in a remote Utah town just in time to save the young and beautiful rancher Jane Withersteen from having to marry a Mormon elder against her will. Lassiter is on his own quest, one that ends when he discovers a secret grave on Jane's grounds. "[Zane Grey's] popularity was neither accidental nor undeserved," wrote Nye. "Few popular novelists have possessed such a grasp of what the public wanted and few have developed Grey's skill at supplying it."

Our book for August will be *The Kingdom of Speech*, the most recent work from "new journalist" Tom Wolfe.

From Alfred Russel Wallace, the Englishman who beat Darwin to the theory of natural selection but later renounced it, and through the controversial work of modern-day anthropologist Daniel Everett, who defies the current wisdom that language is hard-wired in humans, Wolfe examines the solemn, long-faced, laugh-out-loud zig-zags of Darwinism, old and Neo, and finds it irrelevant here in the *Kingdom of Speech*.
