Join us on Monday, November 19, at 7:00 p.m. at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden when Aaron J Romano will present "Race Politics and Cannabis," a presentation that reveals the racially discriminatory origins of cannabis prohibition nationally and within the State of Connecticut.

A criminal defense attorney from Bloomfield, Aaron J. Romano is also legal counsel for CT NORML (the National Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws). Aaron is a graduate of the University of Pennsylvania School of Law and has been practicing law for twenty years.

This presentation is based on the research he performed for a case currently in litigation in Connecticut.

We will start with our customary half hour of coffee and conversation at 7:00 p.m. followed by Aaron's presentation at about 7:30 p.m.
