

Nash Boutros Does Evil On July 23

One of our most popular speakers is returning this month. Nash Boutros, M.D., Professor of Psychiatry and Neurology at Yale University, will talk to us about "Humanism and the Problem of Evil." "Evil" is one of many English words whose meanings have been influenced by the King James translations of Greek and Hebrew words in the Bible. Popular discussions of villains like Timothy McVeigh or mothers who kill their own children may feature this word, but what does it mean?

In English "evil" seems to connote "excessive" badness (this is clearer in German, where the words Uebel and ueber mean "evil" and "over."). In the 23rd Psalm, "I will fear no evil" really means little more in the original Hebrew than "I won't be afraid of any harm, or trouble, or unpleasantness (ra-a)." In Plato's philosophy evil became a kind of abstract reality, a force or principle in the world or in human nature that makes bad things happen, and this influenced Christianity. In New Testament Greek ("deliver us from evil"), apo tou ponerou can mean "from evil" or "from the evil person" or "from the Evil one (the Devil)"; ho poneros suggests one who not only causes terrible things to
