

Are you paying too much for drugs?

Please note that this meeting will be held on Sunday, September 16 at 3:00 p.m.!

The high costs of prescription drugs affect us all. For many, drugs are a major cost of living, alongside food and housing; some simply can't pay for the medicines needed. Drugs are the fastest growing expense of healthcare, and today's advances in biology make possible a proliferation of costly drugs far greater than ever before. In addition, the pharmaceutical companies are making record profits while charging people in other countries much less than Americans pay for the exact same products.

On September 16 Manny Ratafia will discuss how the prices paid for medications are affected by doctors, pharmaceutical and biotech companies, employers, governments, and your behavior as a consumer.

Manny will take on some difficult questions:

- What can be done about this situation?
- What alternatives do individuals have?
- How can our doctors help us and why don't they help more?
- What should our government do?
- Why do we get little help from the news media in answering these difficult questions?

Manny has consulted and published reports on biotechnology, pharmaceuticals and other technology-based industries. His research and opinions have been published and quoted in more than 100 general, trade and scientific publications in the U.S., Europe, and Japan, including Business Week, Forbes, Fortune, The Wall Street Journal and The New York Times.
