Perhaps you saw the Humanist Association of Central Connecticut mentioned on the front page of the Hartford *Courant* of Friday, June 28. The folks at the newspaper wanted to know our position on the separation of religion and government ("church and state"), and in particular our responses to the Ninth Circuit Court's action on the Pledge of Allegiance and the Supreme Court's ruling on school vouchers. So we finally got their attention, and if we have our way there will be more interviews to come.
