Why There Is Already More Peace Than You Think

We are privileged to announce that our speaker for our regular monthly meeting at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden on Monday, April 16, will be Bruce Russett, Dean Acheson Professor of International Relations and Political Science at Yale. Prof. Russett will present the second in our occasional series entitled "Practical Pathways to Peace" (the first speaker in the series, on January 21, was Jennifer Miller).

Past president of the International Studies Association and of the Peace Science Society (International), Russett has edited the Journal of Conflict Resolution since 1973. His grants and fellowships include eleven from the National Science Foundation and multiple awards from each of the Carnegie Corporation, the Ford Foundation, the U.S. Institute of Peace, Fulbright-Hays, the MacArthur Foundation, the U.S. Institute of Peace, and the World Society Foundation of Switzerland. Among his 25 published books, the most recent are New Directions for International Relations (2005, edited with Alex Mintz), and Purpose and Policy in the Global Community (2006).

Conversations: Sam Harris

Join us for Humanist Conversations on Saturday, April 7 at 2:30 p.m. at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden.

Let's talk about some of the less frequently considered ideas from *The End of Faith*. Sam Harris has become a recognized figure in discussions criticizing religion since the publication of this book in 2004. Many of us may be familiar with his thesis that as a guide for human conduct faith leads, inevitably, to dangerous, indeed, potentially disastrous conflicts. This is not all he has to say. Questions raised in Chapter 6 "A Science of Good and Evil" and Chapter 7. "Experiments in Consciousness" concern rational ways to look at experience. Chapter 7. begins, "At the core of every religion lies an undeniable claim about the human condition: it is possible to have ones experience of the world radically transformed. ... most of us know, however dimly, that extraordinary experiences are possible. The problem with religion is that it blends this truth so thoroughly with the venom of unreason." Consider this assertion and, please, bring any other points that interest you for discussion.
