Sources of Energy

Join us at 700 Hartford Turnpike on Monday, October 20, when Manny Ratafia will present "An Overview of New Sources of Energy."

Energy is becoming one of the key issues of our time. We, as individuals, are painfully aware of the increasing costs of gasoline, heating fuel, and electricity. Energy has also long been a central factor in global political and military issues, a major contributor to air and water pollution, and a key part of our national economy and the economies of countries throughout the world. Recently, fossil fuel-based energy sources have been identified as contributing to global warming with potential catastrophic effects to our planet. At our October 20 meeting, Manny will review the many new sources of energy that are being developed, some of which could dramatically impact these issues. Manny will discuss fusion, which has long been the ultimate source of energy and looks unlikely to be available in the foreseeable future; "clean energy" wind and sun which are rapidly being employed; "renewable" sources such as oil, ethanol and other fuel chemicals made from wood; hydrogen and fuel cells; and even plug-in hybrid

Member Albert Rader dead at 80

We regret to announce that long-time HAC member Al Rader died in an accidental fall after leaving his sister's house in Kansas City for a hike on September 1. A grave-side service was held September 8. Al was also a member of The Unitarian Universalist Society in Stamford.

You may remember that Al had been our featured speaker back in March 2000, and that our newsletter for that month contained a biography of Al's life and achievements, part of which is reproduced below:

"Albert W. Rader grew up in Martian City, Missouri, then a suburb one mile east of Kansas and seven miles south of Kansas City, Missouri. He has an S.B. degree in Quantitative Biology (1950) and an S.B. degree in Food Technology (1951) from the Massachusetts Institute of Tech-

nology (the only school that accepted him) and an M.S. degree in Chemistry (1961) from the University of South Carolina (Thesis: The Synthesis of the Five Isomers of Dihydrobiphenyl). After leaving MIT, he worked on the polylactyl stearate bread softener in Kansas City, Missouri. He was a pharmaceutical salesman for Lederle Laboratories in the Columbia, South Carolina, territory. After the University of South Carolina, he worked in Gas Chromatography for Standard Brands, Inc., in Stamford, Connecticut, before escaping to Union Carbide. He received the World War II Victory Medal for joining the U.S. Army one day before the G.I. Bill expired (he needed a vacation from MIT). After retiring he called himself a bum. Now he claims to be an amateur philosopher."

Walkathon

A group of HAC members will be participating in this year's "Cook & Care Walkathon," a three mile charity walk starting in Edgerton Park in New Haven at 1:00 p.m. on Sunday, October 19. Three out of the four charities to receive proceeds from this event focus on feeding the poorest people in New Haven.

This event is organized by the Interfaith Cooperative Ministries (ICM). June Schafer was the USNH delegate to ICM for many years, and was instrumental in keeping the organization together despite lack of support from some of the larger Christian churches in the New Haven area.

While the money raised during the walk will go to funding important charitable works, the services will be delivered by ostensibly Christian organizations.

Our understanding is that we cannot earmark the money for the least religious of the four beneficiaries as it all goes into a general pool. Therefore, when considering whether to join us on the walk, you'll be forced to decide whether the benefit to the end users is worth supporting a religious intermediary.

We will be walking as a team and hope to have something, possibly a team t-shirt, to indicate that fact.

Interestingly, a typical MS Walk offers two, five, and seven mile route options, so this three mile route should be achievable

Book Discussion: "Team of Rivals"

The next book we will read is "Team of Rivals: The Political Genius of Abraham Lincoln" by Pulitzer Prize-winner Doris Kearns Goodwin. Copies of the book, which is available in both hardcover and paperback, are at public libraries as well as bookstores and online.

This book, I think, is particularly relevant to the current situation in U.S. politics and the upcoming presidential election. It is not a short book, but you have plenty of time to read it.

We will meet to discuss this book on Saturday, October 25, 2:30 p.m. until 4:30 p.m. at USNH, 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden. As always, feel free to invite a friend or two.

The following is an excerpt of information and reviews from Amazon.com.

Goodwin makes the case for Lincoln's political genius by examining his relationships with three men he selected for his cabinet, all of whom were opponents for the Republican nomination in 1860: William H. Seward, Salmon P. Chase, and Edward Bates. These men, all accomplished, nationally known, and presidential, originally disdained Lincoln for his backwoods upbringing and lack of experience, and were shocked and humiliated at losing to this relatively obscure Illinois lawyer...

Ten years in the making, this engaging work reveals why "Lincoln's road to success was longer, more tortuous, and far less likely" than the other men, and why, when opportunity beckoned, Lincoln was "the best prepared to answer the call." This multiple biography further provides valuable background and insights into the contributions and talents of Seward, Chase, and Bates. Lincoln may have been "the indispensable ingredient of the Civil War," but these three men were invaluable to Lincoln and they played key roles in keeping the nation intact. —Shawn Carkonen

Team of Rivals doesn't just tell the story of Abraham Lincoln. It is a multiple biography of the entire team of personal and political competitors that he put together to lead the country through its greatest crisis. Here, Doris Kearns Goodwin profiles five of the key players in her book, four of whom contended for the 1860 Republican presidential nomination and all of whom later worked together in Lincoln's cabinet.
