Mark Twain, Humanist Hero

Join us Monday, June 15, at 7:30 p.m. at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden when the Humanist Association of Connecticut's vice-President, Douglas Peary, will return with the latest in his series, "Humanist Heroes." His subject will be Mark Twain.

Mark Twain was born Samuel Langhorne Clemens in Missouri in 1835. His family and uncle had slaves. He began working at a newspaper at a young age when his father died. His life was a strong mixture of joy and sadness. He became a newspaper man and riverboat worker. He encouraged his brother to work on riverboats and his brother was killed when his riverboat exploded. Clemens took the name Mark Twain when he was working in the gold fields in California and writing stories.

Twain met his wife and had a son and three daughters; all but one daughter predeceased him. His remaining daughter's only child, a daughter, died without children, so Twain has no descendants.

He became a close friend of a Congregational Minister in Hartford, Connecticut who was more concerned with social issues than theology. Twain came to despise Christianity and wrote against it extensively but cared deeply about people and believed in the Deistic God of early American leaders. He understood the slave era mentality and hated slavery. He was misunderstood and made to appear to support slavery because he used the language of uneducated slaves. His writing is considered the first great American literature.

He became wealthy but only for a time. He went bankrupt with the help of a friend, Henry Rogers, from Standard oil, who helped him protect his family.

Twain introduced his friend Rogers to Helen Keller and her teacher Anne, and Rogers paid for Keller's college education at Princeton. Twain introduced Rogers to author Ida Tarbell, who had written about Lincoln's ancestors. Tarbell interviewed Rogers and wrote about Standard oil. The resulting book was one of the influences which led to a government investigation which caused the breakup of Standard oil as a conglomerate.

Twain wrote, "...the swindle of life and the treachery of a God that can create disease and misery and crime—create things that men would be condemned for creating—that men would be ashamed to create." "There is no other life; Life itself is only a vision and a dream for nothing

exists but space and you. If there was an all-powerful God, he would have made all good, and no bad."

Directions from the Stamford area: Take Rt. 7 north to I-84 and go east to Exit 17. At the exit turn left onto Rt. 63, go straight to the second stoplight, and turn left (west) onto Rt. 64...

Directions from Hartford or Torrington: Take Rt. 8 or 91 south to I-84 and go west to Exit 17. From the exit go straight ahead (west) on Rt. 64 to the first stoplight...
