

A God In Which I Do Not Believe

P.J. Deak returns with the Story of Abner Kneeland, Blasphemy and the History of Free Thought in America

In Boston in the 1830's, a de-frocked Universalist-Minister-turned-"atheist"-lecturer named Abner Kneeland was accused by his contemporaries of being "a hoary-headed apostle of Satan"; his magazine, "The Boston Investigator," was referred to as "a lava stream of blasphemy and obscenity which blasts the vision and gangrenes the very soul of the uncorrupted reader"; his lectures for the Society For Free Enquiry were dubbed "infidel orgies" by the popular press and a prosecuting attorney in the courts of Boston argued that "if Kneeland were not punished, marriages [would be] dissolved, prostitution made easy and safe, moral and religious restraints removed, property invaded and the foundations of society broken up."

In a nation where "Life, Liberty and the Pursuit of Happiness" are espoused as our most precious values, what could one man possibly believe that would bring the wrath of American society down upon him with such fervor? And why were 2,000 people filling the Federal Street Theater in Boston every Sunday and Wednesday to hear him speak? Find out on July 19 when P.J. Deak introduces Abner Kneeland — a progressive thinker who helped open the doors of social tolerance in 19th century America and pre-dated the Humanist Manifesto by 100 years.

Follow 68 for 4.2 mi, when you will turn left onto CT-17 (Main St.) Take your 2nd right (0.5 mi.) onto Haddam Quarter Rd. In 1.7 mi. turn left at Arbutus St. In 1.4 mi. bear right onto Livingston Rd. The entrance to the park will be on your left in 0.6 mi.

From Hartford: Take I-91 S and take exit 22S on the left to merge onto CT-9 S toward Middletown. Take exit 11. At the end of the exit turn left onto CT-155 (Randolph Rd.) toward CT-17/Durham. In 0.7 mi. turn left at Millbrook Rd. (there's a traffic light and a fire station on your left). In 1.4 mi turn right onto Livingston Rd. and then turn right into the park.

From 84: Take I-691 E toward Meriden and continue onto CT-66 (eastbound). In 2.0 miles turn right onto CT-147 S. In 2.3 miles turn right and continue on CT-147 and CT-157. In 2.5 miles the road takes a sharp left (Middlefield Rd.). At the end of the road, turn right onto CT-17 (Main St.) and then take your first left onto Haddam Quarter Rd. In 1.7 mi. turn left at Arbutus St. In 1.4 mi. bear right onto Livingston Rd. The entrance to the park will be on your left in 0.6 mi.
