Origins Of Humanism: What Took So Long?

Join us on Monday, September 19 at 7:30 p.m. at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden when we will hear from one of our original founders, Dr. David Schafer!

“We humans are story-telling animals. Early stories intended to explain the origins of things became firmly implanted in our traditions. Such myths featured the most familiar agencies, humans or anthropomorphic entities, but supposedly endowed with special powers and beyond human perception. The first recognizable stirrings of Humanism are evident early in the first millennium BCE, when contacts between cultures began to multiply. Differences among stories from different cultures reinforced doubts in skeptical minds, and naïve acceptance of local myths was replaced by individual introspection and rebellion. Historian Karl Jaspers has called this period, from roughly 800 to 200 BCE, the Axial Age. Jaspers and author Karen Armstrong (*The Great Transformation*) have emphasized marked changes in religious thought during the Axial Age. Jennifer Michael Hecht (*Doubt: A History*), on the other hand, has described the concomitant rise of philosophy and skepticism. As I will show, the two are aspects of the same phenomenon. But if the seeds of Humanism were sown in the Axial Age, why did traditional religions flourish for centuries after that while Humanism has come into its own comparatively recently? I will

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offer two explanations—one extrinsic and one intrinsic to Humanism. Both have been, and continue to be, very important.”

David Schafer took his degree in physiology with a minor in physics in 1959 from the University of Minnesota. For the next forty years he taught physiology and conducted research, mainly on cholera, in New York, Calcutta, Bangkok, Minneapolis, and New Haven, under the auspices of the US Fulbright Foundation in India, The Johns Hopkins University Center for Medical Research and Training, the Rockefeller Foundation, and the US Veterans Administration. Retiring from active research, co-founded this organization (HAC), studied and taught at The Humanist Institute, and from 2003 to 2010 was president of the Unitarian Universalist Humanists.

From New Haven: take I-91N to exit 15 for CT-68 toward Yalesville/Durham. In 0.3 mi. turn right onto CT-68. In 0.9 miles route 68 takes a left. Follow 68 for 4.2 miles, when you will turn left onto CT-17 (Main St.) Take your 2nd right (0.5 mile) onto Haddam Quarter Rd. In 1.7 miles turn left at Arbutus St. In 1.4 miles bear right onto Livingston Rd. The entrance to the park will be on your left in 0.6 mile. The pavilion will be on your left.

From Hartford: Take I-91 S and take exit 22S on the left to merge onto CT-9 S toward Middletown. Take exit 11. At the end of the exit turn left onto CT-155 (Randolph Rd.) toward CT-17/Durham. In 0.7 mile, turn left at Millbrook Rd. (there's a traffic light and a fire station on your left). In 1.4 miles turn right onto Livingston Rd. and then turn right into the park. The pavilion will be on your left.
