Speaker at Hartford Area Dinner: The Pardons Project

Even after someone has served their full sentence after conviction of a crime, a criminal record frequently makes it difficult for someone to find employment, housing, apply for benefits, or obtain a license or permit. Connecticut's pardons system provides an opportunity for individuals with criminal convictions to show that they have been rehabilitated, to fully discharge their debt to society, and to obtain some relief from legal barriers to productive citizenship. Our guest speakers at our next Hartford-area dinner will be Jane Kinney-Knotek and Claudia Mangan of Statewide Legal Services of Connecticut, who will discuss the pardon process in Connecticut and the Pardons Project's efforts to assist low-income clients in obtaining a fresh start.

Join us on Tuesday, January 29 at the Wood-n-Tap restaurant at 12 Town Line Road in Rocky Hill. Drinks and socializing begin at 6:30 p.m. followed by dinner and our speakers at 7:00 p.m.

"Freefall" — Joseph Stiglitz

For our Saturday, January 19 meeting we will read "Freefall: America, Free Markets, and the Shrinking of the World Economy" by Joseph Stiglitz.
