A Suicide Economy or Its Opposite, What Will It Be?

Our August monthly meeting, on Monday, August 19 at 7:30 p.m. at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden, features Daniel Finn of Pioneer Valley Local First.

Daniel says his talk “will build on the work of authors and entrepreneurs, such as David Korten, Judy Wicks and Annie Leonard, and will show how many aspects of our economy are taking us down a suicidal path and that unless we want this to be our future, that changing direction will not only be necessary, but better for us and our economy. My talk will help to ask and come up with some of the answers to: What does the suicide economy look like? What are examples of it? If we do change direction, what might the living economy be like? Is economics truly about numbers on a short sighted balance sheet or having positive relationships with every stakeholder? Does ownership matter? Does place matter? Is the proliferation of triple bottom line companies necessary to our future or can companies like Exxon, Walmart, Monsanto, and the company formerly known as Blackwater be trusted to bring us into a bright and healthy future for all 7 billion of us. How might we get from here to there?

I invite you to come have this conversation with me and share your own perspectives.”

Steve says “Take a voyage back in time to nineteenth century New England, when prior to the advent of the Industrial Revolution, handcraft accomplished the work of everyday life. By the middle of the century as Industrialization rose, they co-existed in a unique relationship. This odd combination continued to thrive into the late part

of the twentieth century in a mill in Northern Vermont known as “Ben’s Mill.” This fascinating film raises many thoughts and questions about the progress of civilization and the impact of human beings on the world they inhabit. Ben Thresher is gone now, but this film provides an appreciation of his legacy, and an opportunity to discuss its impact on the future.”

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Book Discussion Group: “The Life You Can Save” by Peter Singer

The Book Discussion Group has selected “The Life You Can Save: Acting Now To End World Poverty” by Peter Singer, Professor of Bioethics at Princeton University. For the first time in history, eradicating world poverty is within our reach. Yet around the world, a billion people struggle to live each day on less than many of us pay for bottled water. In “The Life You Can Save,” Singer uses ethical arguments, illuminating examples, and case studies of charitable giving to argue that our current response to world poverty is not only insufficient but morally indefensible. Singer urges readers to be a part of the solution, helping others as we help ourselves. This is a very short book, and it is widely available in public libraries, as well as in book stores and online. We will meet to discuss it on Saturday, August 24 at 3:00 p.m. at USNH, 700 Hartford Turnpike, Hamden.
