# Darwin vs Hitler: Why Evolution Makes No Comment on Ethics

Paul Chiariello last spoke for HAC in November. We're bringing him back as our special Darwin Day speaker at our monthly meeting on Monday, February 17.

Paul says of his talk: "In Ray Comfort's recent farcical introduction to Darwin's Origin of Species he makes a claim often repeated by Christian fundamentalists: the tragedies of Nazi Germany were inspired, fueled, and made possible by Darwin's 'theory' of evolution. If evolution is true, we're nothing but animals! Survival of the Fittest implies we ought not give a helping hand to those in need. In fact, so the argument goes, we should speed up the process. But is this what we should learn from what scientists claim about Natural Selection? And if not, what moral guidance if any might we glean from it?"

The Book Group will meet at USNH at 2:00 p.m. on February 15 to discuss "Ishmael: An Adventure of the Mind and Spirit" by Daniel Quinn. In case of bad weather, we will meet on February 22.

The narrator of this extraordinary tale is a man in search for truth. He answers an ad in a local newspaper from a teacher looking for serious pupils, only to find himself alone in an abandoned office with a full-grown gorilla who is nibbling delicately on a slender branch. "You are the teacher?" he asks incredulously. "I am the teacher," the gorilla replies. Ishmael is a creature of immense wisdom and he has a story to tell, one that no other human being has ever heard. It is a story that extends backward and forward over the lifespan of the earth from the birth of time to a future there is still time to save. Like all great teachers, Ishmael refuses to make the lesson easy; he demands the final illumination to come from within ourselves. Is it man's destiny to rule the world? Or is a higher destiny possible for him — one more wonderful than he has ever imagined?
