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Humanist Conversations: Interview Day

Join us on Saturday, December 5, 2015 in the library at USNH, 700 Hartford Turnpike, Hamden, when Steve Boshi will introduce us to a movie from 1996.

Steve says, “Two mothers and fathers, a single mother, a single father, a middle-aged son with an elderly father, and four adolescent children applying for admission to Cambridge University.

“Sounds bizarre and complicated? Well, yes, but it all makes perfect sense in *Interview Day* from 1996 by the brilliant English playwright, Jack Rosenthal (running time 1:30). One of the great minds of English television, he will intrigue you with this work, the story is provocative on myriad levels and addresses the fragility of human existence. Join us to experience this delicate and thought-provoking work.”

Yale Humanist Community Events

We're pleased to share the Yale Humanist Community's two December events.

Matt Croasmun will present “Is Meaning Made or Found? Pursuing a Secular Life Worth Living” on Sunday, December 6th at 1:00 p.m. at The Grove, 760 Chapel Street, New Haven. Parking is available on the street (free on Sunday) or in nearby lots.

Once upon a time, the framework for the meaning of life was provided, pre-packaged, and not to be questioned. Not so anymore. Now making meaning is a personal project—perhaps the most important one of our lives. Join Matt Croasmun as he reflects on his experience teaching Yale undergraduates in the Life Worth Living course and asks: How can non-religious folks benefit from the visions of the good life articulated by the world's oldest traditions?

Matt Croasmun is Lecturer of Theology & Humanities at Yale University, Director of Research & Publication at the Yale Center for Faith & Culture, and Staff Pastor at the Elm City Vineyard Church. He teaches the Life Worth Living course at Yale which invites students to wrestle deeply with the visions of the good life articulated by various religious and non-religious philosophical traditions. He holds a Ph.D. in Religious Studies from Yale University, a M.A.R. in Bible from the Yale Divinity School, and a B.A. in Music from Yale College.

On December 20 at 4:00 p.m. on the Upper New Haven Green, across from Phelps Gate (344 College Street, New Haven), YHC will present “Winter Solstice: Creating Light and Warmth During the Coldest, Darkest Time of the Year” with special guest Mary Johnson. The event will be moved to the Grove in the event of inclement weather.

Most of us can identify with the sentiment behind Shakespeare's words: “Winter, thy breath be rude.” On the eve of the winter solstice, despite winter's ill-bred manners, join members of the YHC community for a celebration of winter's beauty and unexpected gifts—including the announcement of an exciting public art project, with details about how you can get involved. Special guest Mary Johnson will facilitate a celebration of our ability to come together to create light and warmth, as we re-commit to the well-being of the people who inhabit our city, nation, and world.

Mary Johnson is a humanist activist and author. A certified Humanist Celebrant, the *New Hampshire A-List* named her the state's top wedding officiant. Her memoir, “An Unquenchable Thirst,” was named one of the year's best nonfiction books by *Kirkus Review*. A former nun, Johnson joined the Missionaries of Charity at age nineteen. During her twenty years as a sister, Johnson lived and worked with Mother Teresa for extended periods. Johnson also serves as Creative Director of Retreats for A Room of Her Own Foundation, a group that supports women writers. Johnson and her writing have appeared widely, including in *The New York Times*, *The Washington Post*, *USA Today*, *O the Oprah Magazine*, *The Huffington Post*, *Bloomberg View*, *Religion News Service*, *The Humanist Magazine*, *National Public Radio*, *CNN*, *MSNBC*, and *The Rosie Show*. Johnson is a firm believer in honesty as service.

Book Discussion: “An Unquenchable Thirst” featuring the author, Mary Johnson!

Our book for December is “An Unquenchable Thirst: Following Mother Teresa in Search of Love, Service, and an Authentic Life” by (now) humanist Mary Johnson. Please note: Ms. Johnson will be present! As usual, we will meet at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden. Probably in the library upstairs.

From the inside cover:

“At seventeen, Mary Johnson saw Mother Teresa’s face on the cover of *Time* and experienced her calling. Eighteen months later, she entered a convent in the South Bronx to begin her religious training...Eventually, she left the church to find her own path — one that led to love and herself. Provocative, profound, and emotionally charged, ‘An Unquenchable Thirst’ presents a rare, privileged view of Mother Teresa and convent life. At the same time, it is a unique and magnificent memoir of self-discovery.”
