Darwin's **Ecological** Experiment

Reminder: We now start our monthly meetings with coffee and conversation at 7:00 p.m. followed by our main monthly presentation at 7:30 p.m.

Join us on Monday, February 15, in the Unitarian Society of New Haven (USNH) Social Hall to celebrate Darwin Day with a fascinating talk by HAC secretary Richard Siddall.

When Dr. David Wilkinson visited Ascension Island in the South Atlantic in 2003, he was amazed by its ecosystem. "I remember thinking, this is really weird," he said. "There were all kinds of plants that don't belong together in nature, growing side by side." Charles Darwin had visited Ascension on the return leg of the Beagle's voyage in 1836. In his diary, he recorded it as an arid, volcanic island. The lush cloud forest Wilkinson found on Ascension Island in 2003 was the product of Darwin and his closest friend, Joseph Dalton Hooker.

We'll start with half an hour of coffee and conversation at the new time of 7:00 p.m. Learn all about Darwin's experiment right after some brief announcements at 7:30 p.m.

Join us on Saturday, February 6, 2015 in the library at USNH, 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden, when Steve Boshi will link the loss of the Franklin Expedition with today's tragedy in Flint, Michigan.

Steve says, "In 1845 the last expedition to attempt to traverse the uncompleted Northwest Passage sails from England. Two ships and 130 men disappear into the Canadian Arctic, never to be seen alive again. In Flint, Michigan, a major tragedy is now unfolding. Join us to learn how these seemingly unrelated events tie together, which will undoubtedly provoke a lively discussion and some elevated blood pressure." The documentary is about an hour long and refreshments will be served.

The 8th Annual Darwin Day Dinner will be held on Saturday, February 13, at The Norwalk Inn & Conference Center, 99 East Avenue in Norwalk. \$62 per person (\$66 after February 7th).

This year's presentation will be, "The Mystery of Sleep," by Meir Kryger, MD, professor of medicine at Yale School of Medicine, who has treated patients with sleep disorders for over 30 years. He is chief editor of the most widely used textbook in sleep medicine, *The Principles and Practice of Sleep Medicine*, soon to be in its sixth edition, and authored *A Woman's Guide to Sleep Disorders*. He has published more than 200 peer reviewed articles and book chapters. What a great chance to learn in only one night how you really spend (approximately) 1/3 of your life!

Book Discussion: "My Promised Land"

Our book for February is My Promised Land: The Triumph and Tragedy of Israel by Israeli journalist Ari Shavit. The discussion will take place Saturday, February 20, 2016, at 2:30 p.m. (not the usual 2 p.m.) in the library of the Unitarian Society of New Haven at 700 Hartford Turnpike, Hamden.

"As it examines the complexities and contradictions of the Israeli condition, My Promised Land asks difficult but important questions: Why did Israel come to be? How did it come to be? Can Israel survive? Culminating with an analysis of the issues and threats that Israel is currently facing, My Promised Land uses the defining events of the past to shed new light on the present. The result is a landmark portrait of a small, vibrant country living on the edge, whose identity and presence play a crucial role in today's global political landscape." —from the book flap.

Ari Shavit has made a storied career of explaining Israel to Israelis; now he shares his mind-blowing, trustworthy insights with the rest of us.
