

John Dietrich and the First Unitarian Society of Minneapolis

Please join us on Monday, August 21 at USNH, 700 Hartford Turnpike, Hamden, when Doug Peary will talk about his work publishing the sermons of John Dietrich, who was influential in developing humanism as minister at what is arguably the most influential Unitarian society: the First Unitarian Society of Minneapolis.

Doug says about his work making Dietrich's writings more available: "I found two books on John Hassler Dietrich several years ago. I saw some parallels of my life with his and that he was my mentor, friend and Humanist Hero. Dietrich wrote about 3,000 sermons in his lifetime on Humanism, but only about 370 of them were preserved and in a mechanical form which was unreadable. Dietrich spoke to thousands of people each week from 1911 to 1938. I have now edited 250 of them in 12 volumes in the last year and will do more of them. I have discovered that Dietrich has developed an entire Philosophy of Life.

"His Church in Minneapolis has started a program to promote Humanism for the next 100 years. In early 2016 I spoke to their minister, Rev. Dr. David Breeden, and asked for permission, which I received, to edit the sermons. Breeden is also head of the UUHumanist Association and on the Board of The Humanist Institute, which recently moved to the Minneapolis area. I attended a meeting at their Church on October 16, 2016, to celebrate 100 years since Dietrich started as Minister there and

Book Discussion: "The Kingdom of Speech"

Please join us at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday, August 19, at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden. Our book for August will be *The Kingdom of Speech*, the most recent work from "new journalist" Tom Wolfe.

From *Amazon*: [The book] is a captivating, paradigm-shifting argument that speech – not evolution – is responsible for humanity's complex societies and achievements.

From Alfred Russel Wallace, the Englishman who beat Darwin to the theory of natural selection but later renounced it, and through the controversial work of modern-day anthropologist Daniel Everett, who defies the current wisdom that language is hard-wired in humans, Wolfe examines the solemn, long-faced, laugh-out-loud zig-zags of Darwinism, old and Neo, and finds it irrelevant here in the *Kingdom of Speech*.

Some see a more generalized monopoly problem rather than a problem specifically with Amazon (*American Prospect*: "Bring Back Antitrust" http://tinyurl.com/y8nd32pl). But nobody can deny that Amazon is astonishingly large (*Visual Capitalist*: "The Extraordinary Size of Amazon in One Chart" http://tinyurl.com/hsn7lqd). So what do you think? Is Amazon using its size, influence, and power for good or evil? Is an organization that large destined to be evil?
