Cohousing and Sociocracy

Cohousing started in Denmark in the 1960s and was brought to the United States in the 1970s. Although there are several cohousing communities in other New England states, Rocky Corner in Bethany is the first in Connecticut to actually break ground.

As a type of intentional community, a cohousing community may cover many acres or less than a city block, but it conforms to principles that foster social relationships among its residents.

Community participation and self-management are hallmarks of cohousing. The self-governance model that has been proven successful in cohousing communities is called sociocracy.

Book Discussion: The Wizard and the Prophet

In November and December we will be reading books by two critically acclaimed authors we have enjoyed at previous discussions.

The selection for November 17 will be "The Wizard and the Prophet: Two Remarkable Scientists and Their Dueling Visions to Shape Tomorrow's World" by Charles C. Mann, an incisive portrait of the two little-known twentieth-century scientists, Norman Borlaug and William Vogt, whose diametrically opposed views shaped our ideas about the environment, laying the groundwork for how people in the twenty-first century will choose to live in tomorrow's world..
