“Humanism Is Alive and Well at the Institute”

Jean Kotkin - Monday, May 10, 7:30 p.m. at the Unitarian Society of New Haven, 700 Hartford Turnpike, Hamden.

The Humanist Association came into being in May, 1989, and every year at this time we invite a distinguished speaker to help celebrate the anniversary of this event. We are proud to announce that this year our speaker will be Jean Kotkin, who will talk to us about the Humanist Institute, the premier institution for training Humanist leaders in North America. Jean came to the Humanist Institute at the height of a rich and varied career with Ethical Culture, one of the major streams of the Humanist movement. The following brief biography captures some of that career: “A former teacher in Montreal, Canada, she has been a reporter, editor, and freelance writer for the Ethical Culture Schools and Society; assistant director of the creative science program at New York University (1968-1970); executive director of the American Ethical Union (1970-1987); Ethical Culture leader (since 1981); executive director and faculty member at the Humanist

“Alternative Medicine”

Presented by Dr. Steven Novella

Dr. Steven Novella will bring us up to date on a subject of profound interest to all of us, “Alternative Medicine.”

The world-wide increase in the popular demand for greater control over all aspects of our lives, widespread distrust of the authority of a medical science that is too often unable to explain and justify its methods to the satisfaction of frightened and suffering patients, the high cost of advanced medical care and doubts about the adequacy of medical insurance, and the promise of miraculous and possibly inexpensive results from treatments rooted in ancient cultures, has led to the rapid and often bewildering growth of a great variety of forms of alternative medicine—from acupuncture to “therapeutic touch,” from herbal medicines to prayer. Add the well-recognized fact that for certain conditions some alternative techniques may offer as much real hope for relief as scientifically based therapies. All this makes it increasingly necessary for those who want to consider all their options to keep well-informed in order to make rational health decisions. Just before he was scheduled to speak for us in March, Dr. Novella attended a major conference on the status of alternative medicines. He keeps a close tab on this swiftly changing field, and is exceptionally well equipped to answer your questions.

This exciting program has been rescheduled for Friday, May 21, at the First Unitarian-Universalist Society of New Haven, 608 Whitney Avenue, New Haven. Refreshments and conversation are at 7:30 p.m., and the main program starts at 8:00. Come and bring a friend!
